Brief account of violence against Women in Jharkhand

From times immemorial, women have been at the receiving end of male dominated society. Despite the march of time and notwithstanding ground-breaking advances in science and technology, women continue to be subjected to violence and torture for a variety of reasons. Infact, violence against women is the manifestation of a historically unequal power relationship between men and women. It is a conditioned response and is not natural or born of biological determinism. The recorded data of the last few decades of this millenium shows frightening signals in the relentlessly soaring graph of violence against women. To the olden days violence against women was the result of the prevalent atmosphere of ignorance and feudalism, today violence against women is an uncontrollable phenomenon which is a direct result of the rapid urbanisation, industrialisation and structural adjustment programmes which are changing the socio-economic scenario of our country.

Women are vulnerable to acts of violence in the family, in the community and by the state. Marital, cruelty, dowry murders, child abuse, incest and battering are some of the common forms of violence that women face in the family. The community metes out rape, sexual harassment, eve-teasing, trafficking and sexual discrimination to the women. Custodial violence and institutional deprivations are two forms of violence meted out by the state.

In Jharkhand, a large number of groups and grass root level organisations have been involved in understanding the different dimensions of violence against women. These groups at their own level have been supporting and empowering women, enabling them to resist gender based violence by providing legal, emotional and psychological support. Some groups have also focussed on countering violence against women at the local level by strengthening community based responses and redressal systems. Besides, there are number of women forums at the state, districts and at blocks level for taking collective action to counter violence.

On the other hand, the state policy on women has also articulated the need to recognise all forms of violence against women as a central development concern and building public opinion as well as taking effective action against the perpetrators of such violence. The state has also started several departments as a response to counter violence against women. In two year old Jharkhand State, the police department has initiated to

start Family Councelling Center and Women Cell in nine selected districts in first phase. Mahila thana and Dowry Advisory Cell has also been running in all districts attached with Superintendent of Police Office. In addition to, there are certain other institutions such as Mahila Battalion Head Quarter, State Women Commission, etc. which are in the process. However inspite of affirmative policies and programmes by the government and initiatives by NGO's, it is evident that systemetic and sustained work is required at various levels to minimise gender discrimination and end gender based violence.

SAMADHAN, Ranchi (Jharkhand) initiated the work on the Resource Directory of institutions and organisations working for violence against women in the state of Jharkhand, with support from UNIFEM, New Delhi. In this directory main focus has been given on mapping support services provided by the government, semi-government, private and NGO's working especially in the field of councelling, legal aid, alternative shelters, skill training, marketting & credit. Similarly organisations working on HIV / AIDS and Traffiking are also given importance in this Directory.

A broad overview of the range of support services for violence against women reveals some concern on the part of the state as well as the NGO sector to address the issue of violence against women. Most of the organisations are involved in addressing broader issues of women's development and empowerment. They are collaborating with different government departments and are implementing various projects and programmes. A common strategy used by most groups for strengthening women's economic opportunities is the formation of Self Help Groups (SHG's)

One of the major activity of the women wing of organisations is to take up the issue of violence such as the case related to desertion, rape, bigamy, dowry, domestic violence, compensation, divorce property, witchcraft etc. These women try to solve the cases by putting it before Mahila Samiti / Mandal or in Panchayat meetings. But most of the groups do not have access to the government services, so they are helpless if the case is not solved at local level. However most of the victim women are needed shelter. In Jharkhand, there is a severe lack of an ideal and good support services regarding shelters for the victim of violence both at government and at NGO level. The insensitivity of the enforcement agencies, and judiciary also has an impact on women seeking these services. Most of the women even do not know about the services provided by the government and therefore publicity of such institutions is equally essential. Finally the study clearly indicates there is a need of systematically documentation and dissemination of the various efforts that have been made at different levels to counter violence against women.

Definition and types of Violence

The term “ violence against women “ following the declaration of UN Commission on the Status of Women (1993) is usually defined as “ any act of gender based violence that results in or is likely to result in physical, sexual or psychological harm or suffering to women , including threats such as acts , coercion or arbitrary deprivations of liberty , whether occurring in public or private life and violence of human rights of women in situations of armed conflict. Violence is also defined as a physical act of aggression of one individual or group against another or other.

Violence against women should be viewed as one of the most crucial social mechanisms by which they are forced into a subordinate position. It is a manifestation of unequal power relations , which has led to men’s domination over and discrimination against women. Thus violence against women is their inferior status in male-dominated society-educationally , economically , politically and socially-there are other factors responsible too. The increasing criminalisation of society , media images of violence, inadequate means to address the cause and consequences of violence, poor enforcement of legal provisions , unabashed consumerism and erosion of traditional values have all added to it.

Types of Violence

Sexual Harassment :- Sexual harassment ranges from teasing and molestation to violent sexual abuse. It is a subject on which women across all class and age groups can be readily mobilized. In many areas powerful and upper caste groups often target poor dalit women. Sexual abuse and other forms of violence are often used to inflict political lessons and to crush dissent. Criminal law does not use the term sexual harassment but speaks instead of outraging the modesty of a woman. Recently the supreme court has laid down certain guidelines as preventive measures against sexual harassment and has directed employers to put certain mechanisms in place.

Rape :- It is the most violent , abrupt and physically painful instance of male aggression. At the physical level , it represents an invasion of person; at the psychological , it results often in deep trauma, shame and guilt. Marital rape is excluded from the definition except when it is committed on a girl below 12 years of age. In addition , although the law prohibits evidence on the antecedents of the accused , it applies a different yardstick for women when such antecedents are often brought into prove cases

against the woman. Rape is punishable under law with a minimum years of seven years but the courts have the power to reduce sentences which they usually do.

Dowry & Dowry Deaths :- Dowry deaths as being one where a woman dies of burns or other injuries within seven years of her marriage and there is evidence of cruelty and harassment by the husband or any relative of her husband , “ for or in connection with any demand for dowry “. Harassment in itself can be cause for considerable agony , anguish and trauma for married women whereas the Cruelty may cause a woman to commit suicide or ‘cause grave injuries or danger of life , limb or health’ , whether mental or physical of the women and harassment related to property demands.

Witchcraft :- In the tribal belt of Jharkhand the incidence of witchcraft is very common . In a majority of the cases , it is found the real motive of the killers was to grab property or to settle personal scores with the victim family . In order to garner support for their nefarious activities , villagers particularly influential people brand female member of a particular family as a witch so that they could get the support of their co-villagers in hounding out or killing the victims family. The villagers believe that the women branded as witch are responsible for the illness , death , drought and despair that is overwhelming the lives of the communities women .

Caste & Class Conflicts :- In Jharkhand caste politics play a very important role in any violence . In this state not only the number of castes and sub-castes is very large , but the politicisation of each caste or caste group has left specific imprint on the political process of the State . Infact , the politics has been characterised by a four fold division – forward – castes, backward-castes , harijan and tribals . Narrowness of caste feeling has contributed a lot to the occurrence of violence in the society . The feeling of casteism and the awareness among the low and the middle classes has mainly led to caste-conflict and tensions . The class conflicts depends on the process of production and the economic infra-structure . The society has been clearly divided into two classes ie. The haves and the have nots . The awareness amongst the have nots has been broken the old relational norms and they are ready to get their economic positions and other rights in society by hook or crook . Infact it has opened a new vista in the field of violence and it is the women who are the ultimate victims.

Communal Violence :- Communal violence is more visible in urban areas as compared to caste violence taking place in rural areas , though with its acceleration in recent years, it may spread to rural areas also. Earlier it was generally thought that riots takes place between the Hindu and the Muslim communities . But the recent development of attacks on minorities may take the serious shape of violence.

Domestic Violence :- The term domestic violence is wide and encompasses in its scope the types of violence resorted to within the home. The overwhelming majority of victims of domestic violence are woman. Domestic violence not only includes conduct which amount to cruelty on a woman by her husband or any of his relative but also includes any act which is unbecoming of the dignity of the woman. The woman are brutally beaten or abused by her husband or in-laws.

Trafficking of women :- Trafficking in women and children is one of the worst and most brazen and abuses of human rights. Trafficking is the legal or illegal movement of women and children by force or through other forms of coercion for the purpose of exploitation and for the consideration of economic and other benefits. Migration, especially illegal migration though distinct and separate is integrally connected to trafficking.

Non-Government Services for Women

Counselling

This chapter gives details of organisations providing counselling services for women.

- ❑ Organisations that have counselling centres or provide counselling on a regular basis have been included in this chapter.
- ❑ Most organisation provide counselling services in the following situations - family disputes and violence, marital problems, mental illness, health problem, mother and child care, education, government welfare programmes, HIV / AIDS, prostitution, trafficking etc.
- ❑ Family disputes and violence cover marital disputes and domestic violence as well as problems faced by women in their natal homes, as unwed, separated, divorced, widowed sisters / daughter and mothers being harassed by children / others for property and other reasons.
- ❑ The organisation providing counselling for drug addicts / alcoholics have been included in this chapter.
- ❑ Information on some organisation dealing with cases of adoption are also included.
- ❑ For each organisation the address, phone number, issues addressed, persons counselled, days & timings and their strategy to tackle the problem are given.
- ❑ Most of the organisations do not charge any fee for counselling services.
- ❑ Panchayati Raj and Self Help Group are the common activities undertaken by all organisation, so it is not mentioned in this chapter.

Legal Aid

This chapter gives details of organisations providing legal aid services for women.

- ❑ Organisations that have legal aid centres or provide legal services on a regular basis have been included.
- ❑ Organisations mentioned in this chapter, provide support in the areas of legal counselling, preparation of case related documents, lawyer's assistance, lawyer's fees, assist for fighting cases in court, bear court expenses and settle cases through Lok Adalat etc.
- ❑ Most organisations have a fixed day and timing for providing legal aid and these have been included in this chapter. However some organisations do not have a fixed day or time and provides legal aid whenever it is required.
- ❑ For each organisation, the address, phone number, criteria, types of cases addressed, timings, nature of assistance and procedure strategy and methods to solve the problems.
- ❑ Most organisations do not take any fee for legal aid services.

Shelter

This chapter gives details of organisation that provide shelter to women.

- ❑ Detailed informations on different kinds of shelters short stay homes, working women's hostels, special shelters and old age homes. This has been done with the objectives of addressing all possible kinds of crisis situations that women face and covering women of all age groups.
- ❑ For each organisation the name of the home, address, phone numbers, capacity, criteria, duration of stay, with/without children etc. are mentioned.
- ❑ Old age homes which provide shelter to abandoned elderly women, have been indicated separately.
- ❑ Under special shelter, shelter for destitutes, unwed mother, handicapped orphan, adolescent girl etc. have been mentioned separately.
- ❑ There is a severe shortage of all kinds of shelters for women and these are basic constraints in all those that do exist.
- ❑ There are very few options for married women with children, who are facing violence in their home, but cannot leave for want of shelter. Even where they do, there are age limits. Short stay homes are free and accomodate women for a maximum of three years.

Skill Training

A large number of organisations provide skill training on a regular basis. We have included details of the kinds of training available, qualifications required, age specifications, duration of the training, fees and stipends if any. We have not deliberately not mentioned the time of change. We have mentioned the minimum qualifications required for the courses, but some organisations are flexible as far as this is concerned.

- ❑ Some organisations do not provide skill training themselves, but refer women to others organisations for training.

Marketing

This chapter gives details of organisations that provide marketing facilities for products made by small producer groups, cooperatives, NGO's or individual women. We have included details about the kind of products marketed, the marketing channels used and the terms of purchase.

- ❑ Most organisations market handicraft and handlooms products either through retail outlets, or exports and exhibitions which are held from time to time.

Credit

This chapter gives details of organisations providing loans to women for purpose of business or otherwise.

- ❑ We have mentioned the purpose for which the loan is given, the amount of loan, the rate of interests and the terms of payment.
- ❑ Some organisations have more than one sources of loans under which they provide credit to women. All these schemes have been included.
