<b><u>Programme description</u></b>	<p>The Ministry of Local Government &amp; Rural Development (MoLG&amp;RD), Government of Pakistan (GoP) with support from UNDP and its cost-sharing partners is implementing Gender Justice Through Musalihat Anjuman Project (GJTMAP). It is a novel Project with the goal 'to assist women and other vulnerable sections of society in improving their conditions through safeguarding and promoting their rights and lawful entitlements' for petty disputes and other matters, as per Rules of Business (RoBs) notified by Provincial Governments, considering that the institutional safeguards offered by the formal justice sector institutions have not been able to perform their role.</p> <p>Being the Secretariat in Pakistan, GJTMAP is following up through the regional consultative meeting on the MenEngage Pakistan Country Plan and seeking commitments of partner organisations and core group members, etc. for the National Alliance building.</p> <p>As agreed by the MenEngage Pakistan following is its goal:</p> <p>Long Term:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>* To engage men and boys in the efforts for gender equality and ending violence.</li> </ul> <p>Short Term:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>* A growing network of UN agencies, NGOs, including Government of Pakistan to prevent gender based violence through active involvement of men and boys.</li> </ul>

<b><u>Programme description</u></b>	<p>Rozan is an Islamabad based NGO working on issues related to emotional and psychological health, gender, violence against women and children, and the psychological and reproductive health of adolescents. Most Rozan team members are qualified psychologists who work to enhance the emotional health of people from all sections of the society by conducting awareness raising activities, trainings and counseling.</p> <p>Rozan is an Islamabad based NGO working on issues related to emotional and psychological health, gender, violence against women and children, and the psychological and reproductive health of adolescents. <b>Examples of a existing innovative practices</b>	<p>A) Trainings</p> <p>Rozan views the issues of violence and gender stereotyping in the overall context of emotional health and believes that self-awareness is an essential component in sustainable behavioral change.</p> <p>Rozan has designed sensitization and capacity building trainings on issues of emotional health, gender, and violence that seek to address society holistically through its main players, i.e. women, men, youth, and children. Key institution and systems that play a significant role in creating a healthy society are also focused upon, i.e. parents, teachers, health professionals, police, government departments, and other civil society groups and organizations.</p> <p>Rozan has created a niche with regards to the style of facilitation, approach and attitudinal change work.</p>

<p><b>Any other related information</b></p>	<p>An important aspect of Rozan activities is addressing the strategic interests of both women and men without losing focus of practical needs of individuals . Rozan feels that both</p>

	<p>kinds of needs are important and must be addressed. For instance, providing counseling to women and children in distress addresses a practical need, while at the same time empowering them through life skills ensures that strategic needs are addressed as well. In gender trainings Rozan meets the specific requirement of the organization for gender sensitive activities, while at the same time it builds capacity of the organization and its staff to address inequitable distribution of power in the organization and community.</p> <p>Another feature is Involving men as active partners has always been an essential thrust of Rozan's outreach . Men have an equal role to play in this change, not just in their role as supporters but as active partners, because these interventions ultimately affect men, be it in the challenging of power structures, or the role of fathers as protectors of children against child sexual abuse, or the role of non-violent men in raising consciousness on violence against women.</p>

<b><u>Programme description</u></b>	<p>The mission of SAHIL is to create a protective environment for the children of Pakistan through advocacy, support systems for children, awareness on body protection, enhancing legal and psychological services for the victims of CSA to pursue its vision that “no child has to be a victim of child sexual abuse”. <b><u>Programme description</u></b>	<p>The vision of Rahnuma - FPAP is to lead a right based movement using the ICPD holistic development paradigm which strengthens family well being, enables empowerment of women, supports youth and protects children.</p> <p>FPAP is committed to :-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>* Promoting Family Planning and Sexual &amp; Reproductive Health as a basic human right.</li> <li>* Providing sustainable and quality sexual &amp; reproductive health and family planning services to men, women and youth in partnership with government, NGOs and civil society.</li> <li>* Improving the quality of life of the poor and marginalized.</li> </ul>
<b>Examples of a existing innovative practices</b>	<p>Youth Project</p> <p>Pakistan's youth, about 32.3% of population, face the issues like illiteracy and un-employment and lack of SRH information. The environmental factors especially in slum areas intensify their problems and lead to frustration driving them to crime, extremism and use of drugs. Concerted and pro-active efforts will be required in the fields of knowledge, information and skills to empower them as well as provide them with youth friendly SRH services. Youth Programme advocates for empowering youth in Pakistan by building their capacity and skills to access SRH services in RAHNUMA - FPAP operational areas. It advocates the operationalization of National Youth Policy addressing the SRH needs of young people at Provincial &amp; District level in RAHNUMA - FPAP's areas of operation. Youth Programme increase access to comprehensive, youth friendly, gender sensitive RH</p>

	<p>information, education and services. It is needed that all adolescents and young people are aware of their sexual and reproductive rights, are empowered to make informed choices and decisions regarding their SRH, and are able to act on them.</p> <p>The male youth component focuses on young people awareness of their sexual and reproductive and rights. It aims to provide the young people an enabling environment so that they may exercise their rights freely and make informed choices. Main activities of the project cover development and implementation of BCC strategy, training in BCC, meetings with political/opinion leaders besides maintenance of Youth Resource Centers and Youth Help Lines. The project will also impart Life Skills Based Education Trainings and produce relevant IEC material. Young people will be also trained in SRHR and related issues.</p>
<p><b>Key partners and networks with whom you work</b></p>	<p>Started in seventies as part of FPAP's male involvement in organized labour sector at Lahore &amp; Faisalabad, the Family Planning Association of Pakistan renewed its partnership with Pakistan Railways aiming to benefiting 120,000 people.</p> <p>Army is the largest single employer of males in the active reproductive age group including the retired persons. Average retirement age being 38 years and as such this segment comprises a large base. Army Jawans (soldiers) mostly belong to rural areas where they frequently visit during their service and also settle after their retirement and as much, can create a ripple effect nationally</p> <p>The history of FPAP's collaboration with Pakistan Army goes back to early eighties when two models of male involvement for F.P. services Garrison Model and training model were tested at Kharian and Quetta respectively. Interventions operationalized against the backdrop of ICPD and envisaged to encourage and promote equal participation of men and women in all areas of family planning and child raising, it emphasized men's shared responsibilities and active involvement in planned parenthood, reproductive behaviour, prevention of STDs and high-risk pregnancies.</p> <p>Azad Jammu &amp; Kashmir comprising seven administrative districts viz Muzaffarabad, Rawalakot, Sudhnoti, Bagh, Kotli, Mirpur and Bhimber is the divided part of the state of Jammu &amp; Kashmir disputed between India &amp; Pakistan.</p>

<b>2. Programme Information</b>	
<b><u>Programme description</u></b>	Under the 'key vulnerable project' PAVHNA conducted sensitization and orientation programmes on violence against vulnerable groups and meetings were held with Police, City government, Legal Aid and Male Clients. Organized ToTs for capacity building of NGOs for providing Behavior specific Life Skills, Street theaters, added Male involvement as a cross cutting in all the projects and has trained its staff on male involvement.
<b>Examples of a existing innovative practices</b>	<p>PAVHNA's part of the project is titled " PAVHNA Program for Protection of Young Adults in Selected Areas of PakiBalochistan and Muzaffarabad in Azad Jammu and Kashmir . PAVHNA's stan " which is currently being implemented in two districts, Killa Saifullah in proposed interventions is intended to give youth and adolescents (ages between 15-24), an opportunity of providing them their own space, a Youth Friendly Center (YFC), where they can talk freely, enjoy recreational activities, learn new skills, improve their literacy and get information on ARH. The YFCs were established in collaboration, consensus and community support to avoid possible judgmental attitudes and cultural specific constraints.</p> <p>PAVHNA established 4 Youth Centres, 2 each for boys and girls in Karachi and Larkana. The centers are furnished, fully equipped and operational. Project sites are peri-urban The project is covering a total population of 560,000 adolescent/youth in the 4 project sites. The target groups or direct beneficiaries are boys and girls between 13-25 years of age. PAVHNA started - one stop service centre for young boys and girls in Karachi and Larkana, providing them reproductive health information, counseling and services with skill-training and recreational facilities under one roof.</p>

	<p>Theatre has become a very powerful instrument in community mobilization. Besides providing entertainment, it grooms, educates and teaches the audience on many of the issues which are related to their surroundings. PAVHNA, as one of the leading organizations in community mobilization, has contributed to the concept of street theatre by developing its own theater group comprising of adolescents and youth. PAVHNA's Theater Group received their theater trainings from FACE and Rasti and advanced training from Tehrik-e-Niswan.
